



**AN INTRODUCTION FOR A NEW
PROMOTER TO
THE ORGANISATION OF A
PSA TOUR EVENT**

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What does a tournament have to provide in order to become a PSA World Squash Tour sanctioned event?

- ◆ Check with the PSA on a suitable date well in advance. It is advisable that you register the event at least 3 months before it is due to commence. For Four star events and above you need to check Page 8 of the PSA Tour Guide for the guidelines on registering.
- ◆ To register, an event needs to complete and return the Tournament Contract form with the necessary registration fees - **registration fee and the player levy**. If the event offers less than \$10,000 prize money this fee is \$500usd, above that it is 5% of the on-site prize money. **No event is confirmed on the PSA calendar until these fees are received by the PSA.**
- ◆ Make sure the courts are in good condition and that the floors are "unsealed". This is extremely important for safety reasons. Court floors should be sanded at least 6 weeks before the event. Players can refuse to play if the floors are "sealed".
- ◆ All matches must be played with the official PSA ball. Currently this is the Dunlop XX.
- ◆ All matches must use point-a-rally scoring (PAR) as determined by the PSA. Currently this is PAR to 11. Details on scoring on Page
- ◆ Adhere to the PSA schedule for matches, for example in a 16 draw for events under \$10,000 - up to two rounds per day may be played in both main draw and qualification.
- ◆ Provide PSA with a copy of any club rules, including dress code, which can be sent to players when they are confirmed in the event.
- ◆ Prize money to be paid to each player on his elimination from the tournament. Prize money may be paid by cheque or cash in US Dollars. If you wish to pay in local currency, this has to be requested at the time of the tournament registration.
- ◆ Send the results daily to the PSA office and Howard Harding, the PSA Media Director, so that the event can receive maximum exposure in the press. All results, both main and qualification draws, should have complete game scores & length of match. These results will be published on the PSA website.

The above is just a brief synopsis; you should make yourself acquainted with the current PSA Tour Guide as it contains all the rules and regulations - particular reference should be made to Sections 3 & 4.

What does PSA provide to an event as part of the PSA World Squash Tour?

Part of the PSA service to an event is the following:

- ◆ **Entry forms** PSA will produce and distribute the tournament entry form to all its members.
- ◆ PSA will advertise the event on its tour calendar and website.
- ◆ **Weekly entry lists** Events will be provided with a weekly update of entries, commencing about six weeks before the closing date for entries. A promoter will be able to check his entries also by accessing the PSA website (www.psa-

squash.com). Details on how to do this is given when the event is registered.

- ◆ **Draw** The PSA office will make the draw and distribute it to the players with the Event Information Sheet.
- ◆ **Player Photographs** Super Series events will receive colour photographs of the top 8 seeds, **free of charge**, for promotional use. Any other PSA sanctioned Tournament can order player photographs through the PSA and the charge is **\$26usd** each colour photograph.
- ◆ **Player Profiles** These are available on the PSA website - go to Rankings and click on the players name and his profile will come up. When the event entries are confirmed the Promoter will be sent by email all the player profiles of the main draw players. Biographies of the top 16 entries will be sent automatically to all Super Series events.
- ◆ **PSA Logo** The Tournament will be provided with the PSA logo for use on all event stationery, posters and other promotional material.
- ◆ **PSA Message** The Tournament can be provided with a PSA message, on request, for the tournament programme.
- ◆ **PSA tin stickers** The Tournament will be provided with PSA tin stickers for use during the event. One PSA tin sticker **must be** affixed to the courts used for the main draw.
- ◆ **PSA Certificate** After the conclusion of the tournament, the PSA will send the Promoter a PSA Certificate certifying the successful conclusion of the tournament.
- ◆ **Squash Balls** The official ball of the PSA World Tour is the Dunlop XX yellow dot ball and its use is **mandatory** for all PSA World tour events. Complimentary balls will be sent to each event as follows:
 - 3 dozen for a 16 draw tournament
 - 5 dozen for a 32 draw tournament

And most importantly the support of the PSA Office in Cardiff. They are always on hand to offer advice, answer any questions or queries that you may have.

ELEVATED STAR STATUS - what is it and how does it work...

In order to increase the ranking value (total compensation) of an event, the Promoter can apply the Elevated Star Status. One of the most popular ways of increasing the ranking value of an event is by offering hotel or private hospitality but some tournaments may be able to offer some of the other categories as well.

Here is a description of the categories which are eligible for Elevated Star Status:

Hotel

Double occupancy twin-bedded room with bathroom and toilet, TV, telephone/ room service (minimum 3 Star standard), one meal per day, reasonable transportation to and from the venue if not within walking distance. Accommodation is for **ALL** main draw players from night before main draw commences to the morning after the final.

Private Hospitality

Single occupancy, bathroom/toilet, one meal per day, transportation to and from venue if not within walking distance. Accommodation must be for **ALL** main draw players. from night before the main draw commences to the morning after end of tournament.

National Open title

The event **must be** the National Open of the country. There can be only one National Open per calendar year.

TV

A minimum three camera "Outside Broadcast" standard TV production of, at least, the semis and finals.

Glass/Plastic court

Main draw must be played on either a permanent or portable glass/plastic court, PSA approved.

Flights

All main draw direct entries to receive free flights to and from the city where the event is held.

Food

All Main draw players to receive breakfast, lunch and dinner, free of charge.

Here below is a schedule which shows the \$value given to the above categories.

***Explanation of hotel & private hospitality bonus**

- **Main draw players (32 & 64 draws) minimum 3 nights** accommodation from night before the main draw starts - check out the day after you loose. Semi finalists to be allocated single rooms until departure day after final. **Half hotel bonus applies.**
- If Promoter wishes to provide accommodation for the duration for the event, that is from the night before it commences to the morning after it finishes, **for all main draw players**, then the **full hotel bonus applies.**
- Qualifiers - if promoter provides accommodation either hotel or private then bonus (see above) to be included in total compensation.

We have provided here are some examples of how the elevated star system works and how an event can increase its total compensation. The star level of the event is based on total compensation not just on-site prize money:

QATAR CLASSIC

On-site prize money: \$100,000
 National Open Title: \$ 5,000
 Hotel (32 draw) \$ 10,000
 Television \$ 2,500
 Glass/Plastic court: \$ 2,500

TOTAL COMPENSATION \$120,000 = SUPER SERIES PLATINUM

THE "ONE STOP" OPEN

On-site prize money: \$ 8,000
 Hotel (16 draw): \$ 2,000
 Food: \$ 675

TOTAL COMPENSATION \$10,675 = ONE STAR LEVEL

THE "TWO STOP" OPEN

On-site prize money: \$ 8,000
 Private Billeting (16 draw): \$ 1,000
 Food: \$ 675

TOTAL COMPENSATION \$9,675 = SUPER SATELLITE LEVEL

BRAZIL OPEN

On-site prize money: \$ 6,325
 Hotel (16 draw): \$ 1,000
 National Open Title: \$ 750
 Glass court: \$ 1,250
 Food: 675

TOTAL COMPENSATION \$10,000 = ONE STAR LEVEL

As you can see from the above with Elevated Star it is possible to raise your event to another star level, which will then offer more ranking points (see PSA Tour Guide for Ranking Points Allocation). The higher the star level of the event the more likely you are to attract higher ranked players.

NON SCORING OPTION

- ❖ Do you want to have some top players play in your event?
- ❖ Is prize money a barrier for you?

Well, we may be able to help you. Did you know that if you ask for a **Non Scoring option** when you register your new** event you might well attract a top player or players to play in it. PSA has devised a method by which players can play in lower level tournaments without it adversely affecting their ranking.

****A new tournament is any tournament which has not appeared on the previous year's PSA Tour.** The PSA Board may consider granting non-scoring status to a tournament in its **SECOND** year, should it be seen that there are signs of potential growth in that country in the number of other PSA sanctioned events under \$15,000usd.

Non Scoring Conditions:

- (a) No more than 2 "non scoring" players may play an event.
 - (i) **Player one** can be the choice of the Promoter.
 - (ii) **Player two** will be the highest ranked player to apply.
- (b) The player must indicate on the entry form if he is applying for "non scoring" status.
- (c) A PSA player may apply for "non scoring" status in any new PSA event, no matter where held.
- (e) Only players who have competed in eight events in the preceding 12 months may apply for non scoring option.
- (f) Any non scoring player who withdraws from the event after the closing date will be subject to all the PSA Code of Conduct penalties.

In the event of more than two players applying for non scoring status, the player not granted non scoring status shall be notified of the fact and may withdraw from the event up to 24 hours after the closing date for entries with no penalty.

- (g) A player will only be allowed to play two "non scoring" events in a calendar year (1st January/ 31st December)

Any player who comes up against a "non scoring" player in the event, has the option of not taking ranking points for that event.

PSA RULE ON EXEMPT (LOCAL) PLAYERS

A tournament Promoter can reserve up to 25% (up to 50% in Satellite events, that is, events under \$10,000 total compensation) of places in a qualification draw for exempt (local) players. A Promoter can apply in exceptional circumstances for an increase.

A Promoter must submit a full list for exempt (local) players names, and include any reserves, to the PSA office in writing, by the stated closing date for entries. This list

becomes final after the 7 day period of qualifiers to withdraw. **Once the Exempt (local) list is designated final, a Promoter CANNOT add or amend it.**

If a Promoter chooses to have a pre-qualification event in order to get his exempt (local) players he must submit the names of all the participants in the pre-qualification event, by the above time schedule. A promoter is not allowed to replace an exempt (local) player with another exempt player unless they are on the Final Exempt (local) player list. This may mean that a qualification draw has byes should there be withdrawals.

No Exempt (local) player can be placed in the entry list if he has a ranking higher than the last PSA entry in the qualification list.

If an Exempt (local) player, who is a PSA member, does not turn up for an event or withdraws late he will get a zero (99) score.

The guiding definition of an Exempt (local) player is that he should meet the following criteria.

- ❖ Should be a national or multi-national of the country, where the tournament is held.
- ❖ If a non-national he should reside within 25 miles of the venue of the tournament.
- ❖ He should have legitimate attachment to the club.

Notwithstanding the above the PSA Board may grant exempt player status in special circumstances. Any such requests must be made in writing stating reasons and circumstances for the request.

WILDCARDS

The PSA will sanction the use of Wildcards as follows:

- ❖ Any PSA Tour event, including the World Open, may have one wildcard, **if they so wish.**
- ❖ A promoter has to confirm the name of his wildcard before the closing date for entries.
- ❖ The wildcard has to be a **WORLD, CONTINENTAL, COUNTRY OR JUNIOR** member of the PSA.
- ❖ That a PSA MEMBER can only have **one wildcard per calendar year (1st January - 31st December)**

The PSA Board expects that a Promoter utilises the use of a wildcard place in a reasonable and responsible manner.

GUIDELINES FOR PROMOTERS ON WHAT THEY NEED TO OFFER IF THEY ARE PROVIDING HOTEL OR PRIVATE BILLETING

When putting on a PSA event, you can offer either Hotel or Private Billeting for main draw players and this additional service will help with elevating the event (see PSA Tour Guide). There will be changes to the conditions as from 1st January 2005 (see below).

As a promotional aid players losing in a Main Draw, who wish to continue to enjoy the hotel bonus/private billeting, shall commit to one hour of activities per day on behalf of the Promoter, if requested.

Herewith are the general rules that apply **for hotel accommodation**:

Double occupancy - twin bedrooms with bathroom, toilet, TV, telephone, reasonable transportation to and from the venue if not within walking distance. Minimum one meal per day

Some PSA events may prefer to **offer private billeting**. It can often be a way in which club members become fully integrated with the running of an event.

Herewith are the general rules that apply **for private billeting**.

Single, preferably, or double occupancy, minimum one meal per day, bathroom/toilet, transportation to and from venue or within walking distance. Here are some guidelines which we hope will give you an indication of what you need to provide, and more importantly, what the players are not entitled to.

Arrival

Players will arrive normally on the eve of their first match in qualifier or main draw.

If players ask to arrive earlier then please say no - **they shouldn't ask**. The reason for this is that we would not wish for local hospitality to be abused. However, your help in offering accommodation suggestions for early arrivals from other countries would be greatly appreciated by players.

Departures

Players losing in the qualification are expected to depart the day after qualification ends.

In accordance with accommodation bonus rules, main draw players may stay for as long as they wish during the period of the main draw. Latest departure would be the morning after the final. Similarly, players should not ask to stay beyond the end of the event.

Partners

You are definitely not required to host partners, family of friends of players under any circumstances.

NOTE: It is important that the PSA office is advised should any player make requests that fall outside the allowable requirements detailed above. This will help us ensure that there is no repetition and the goodwill of the hosts is not abused.

Beds

Players should be offered their own single bed in a bedroom.

Players often need to rest after practice and before their match so a bedroom rather than a lounge would be appreciated.

Meals

Hosts are asked to provide breakfast for players. No other meals need be offered nor be expected.

Transport

Assuming the hospitality is not within walking distance of the club (and ideally no further than 20 minutes from the club by car):

- a) Players will normally need a lift from the club to their billet on arrival.
- b) Scheduled pick-up or a lift to and from the club for practice and play.

Laundry

If players are in the midst of a circuit then if they can have access to their billets washing machine it will be much appreciated.

Allergy

If any players has an allergy, to dog/cats for example, it is their responsibility to contact the event organiser in advance of arrival so that this can be taken into account.

What PSA expects from players

- ❖ Courtesy and politeness
- ❖ They will obey house rules
- ❖ Avoid disturbing family late at night
- ❖ Not abuse the hospitality offered
- ❖ Not ask for more days etc.

Should any PSA player not do so, we need to know.

PSA MEDIA RIGHTS

1. All Super Series Events are now classified as Television Super Series Events for inclusion in the PSA Super Series international television programmes, distributed worldwide to a large and growing audience.

The Super Series conditions that pertain to registration now include, the requirement to provide flights (reasonable; either two or three) and accommodation for the PSA television operators who will attend the event on site. PSA and their tv production partner, ProActivetv, will liaise prior to the Super Series event to ensure satisfactory arrangements are made with the Super Series promoters.

At the end of the final, the promoter must provide immediate copies of the semi finals and final of the on-site master videotapes to PSA's tv Consultant/Director.

2. All PSA events - television and New Media Rights.

- All Domestic television rights rest with the event promoter.

- All International television rights and Video news rest with the PSA.
- All "New Media" and Internet rights rest with the PSA. "New Media" includes "streaming", which is also an international distribution.

There can be no filming at PSA events, except for domestic terrestrial broadcast, without the written permission of PSA. This includes filming for coaching purposes either of individual or for team purposes. If a promoter is in any doubt over this please contact the PSA Office for further clarity as necessary. It remains the promoters final responsibility to ensure that these duties are strictly adhered to (such as monitoring your audiences for hand held cameras) and that the event thereby remains in compliance with our registration agreement.

PSA PHOTOGRAPHIC SERVICE

- PSA Super Series Events will receive, free of charge, colour photographs of the top 8 seeds. Any additional photographs will be chargeable \$26.00usd each. These photographs may be used for the tournament programme and local PR use only.
- PSA tournaments can purchase colour player photographs at a cost of \$26.00usd each. These photographs may be used for the tournament programme and local PR use only.
- If a tournament uses photographs, supplied through the PSA, in their tournament programme **they must include the name credit "SquashPics.com"**.

- PSA would like to receive a copy of the Tournament Programme and Poster.

PSA SCORING POINT-A-RALLY (PAR) TO 11

As from the end of August 2004, the PSA has introduced a change to the scoring for PSA sanctioned events. Point-a-rally will continue to be used but it will be up to 11. **ALL PSA sanctioned events tournaments must use the following scoring format.**

1. Each game is scored up to 11 (eleven) points, point a rally.
2. Matches are best of 5 (five) games.
3. Rest in between games to remain as per PSA rules (two minutes).
4. a). If the game score reaches 10-10 (ten all) there is no election by the receiver. A player must win the game/match by two clear points.

b). The Marker to call: "10 - 10 (ten all), tiebreaker, player to win by two clear points." This announcement to be made only for the first game where the score reaches 10 all. Thereafter, Marker to call from second game on, at 10 - 10 (ten all): "10 - 10 (ten all), tiebreaker."

c). The Marker to then call the score as: "11 - 10 game ball (or match ball)", then "11 - 11" (eleven all), then "12 - 11 game ball (or match ball)", then "13 - 11 game to ** (match to **)."

d). Service to continue as per current PSA rules.

5. The game score is then recorded, for all purposes, as: 11-10 (3-1). All scores are recorded with 11 as the winning player's score.

When submitting the results to the PSA Office & PSA Media Director, Howard Harding, you must record each game score, length and time of each match. **It is most important that if there is tie break that you record in brackets the tie break score.**

In order to help us monitor the new scoring system, it would be appreciated if you can provide to us the referee sheet from each match **from the round of 16 upwards**. This will help us to carry out a continuing exercise on game lengths as part of our ongoing analysis of the new scoring system. We also require the times of the individual games of each match.

Please ask your Tournament Referee to send them over to us either by fax (44) 2920 228185 or through the mail. We would like to receive **this documentation within 7 days of the completion of the tournament, at the very latest.**

As you can appreciate this is a very important issue and your co-operation in this matter will help us enormously.

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

Who produces & sends out my tournament entry form?

The PSA will produce the entry form from the information on the Tournament Contract. The Tournament Promoter will be sent a draft to check and amend, as is necessary. PSA will then distribute the form to all its members - this is done through mail, email and it is also available on the PSA website. The entry form is normally sent out about 2/3 months before the closing date.

Who sets the closing date for entries?

The PSA in conjunction with the Promoter. The closing date will not be less than 3 weeks from the commencement of the main draw. To help the players with their travel plans the closing date is normally set during the first 2 weeks of the month. All closing dates have a 12 noon (UK) deadline. No late entries are accepted and only written entries accepted.

How can I check who has entered my event?

Once the entry form has been issued to the PSA Players, you can check your entries by accessing the PSA website www.psa-squash.com - click on the Promoters Area - User Name: psa2 Password: promoter. On the home page you will note that it is here that you will be able to access your current list of entries for your event.

What is the deadline for submission of wildcard name and Exempt "local" players?

These names need to be with the PSA before the 12 noon deadline on the closing date. With regards to "locals" it is always advisable to submit a reserve list with your "local" entries as you cannot add or amend this list once the closing deadline has passed.

My event has Non Scoring Status, if there are more than 2 players who wish to be non scorers who chooses?

Player one is your choice: Player 2 is the highest ranked to apply. The PSA office will confirm with you after the closing deadline if you need to choose. This has to be done within 24 hours of the closing deadline.

Who does the draw?

The PSA office will do the main draw normally within 48 hours of entries closing. This will be sent over to you before it is uploaded onto the PSA website. The draw can only be accessed through the Members Area in the Members calendar.

The qualification draw should be made on-site at least one hour before the commencement of the first match in the qualification. Please make sure you know the rules regarding the qualification draw.

Do I have to use registered referees?

Tournament Promoters are strongly advised to appoint a minimum number of International/World referees as follows:

Satellite events	1 International/World
Star Series (under \$20,000)	as above
Star Series (over \$20,000)	2 International/World
Super Series	3 International/World
World Open	3 World

Can I also use players to referee/mark?

If requested at the time of registration, on-site PSA players may serve as referees/markers. They have to be advised of this on the entry form.

If you are using player officials, then the following will apply:

In the early rounds, the losing player of a match shall be required to referee or mark the following match. This player is responsible for finding a suitable replacement should he be unable to fulfil his refereeing obligation. Players who fail to provide this service should be reported to the PSA.

When appointing match officials is there anything specific I should be aware of?

Yes, you must make "every effort" not to use in a match a referee of the same nationality as either competitor.

Are players allowed to wear T-shirts in a match?

A player can only wear a T-shirt if it is part of a branded non-collared shirt & shorts outfit.

Are there any specific rules on clothing if the match is being televised?

For any match covered by television, player's clothing should conform to the advertising regulations published and generally applied by the appropriate television authority of the country in which the match is being televised.

Both players should wear distinctly different coloured clothing. The higher ranked players, as of the events final entry list, will have first choice. It is the player's responsibility to check on this.

How is the prize money paid out?

Prize money is normally paid out in US Dollars by either cheque or cash. If the Promoter wants to pay out in local currency then a request should be made, in writing, when the Tournament is registered. The PSA will provide the Promoter with a breakdown of the prize money and how it should be paid out. This figures take into account the deduction of the PSA player levy but do not take into account any local taxes. If local taxes are applicable then the Promoter must provide the players with an Official Tax Certificate when he pays the player his prize money.

When, and to whom should I send the results?

Results, both qualification and main draw, should be sent on a **DAILY** basis either by email or fax to the following -

All results should show full game scores, length of match and time of match. It would be appreciated if you could give a brief description of play, certainly any close games between a top seed and a qualifier or two top seeds. All this information helps Howard produce reports for dissemination to all his media contacts, worldwide, and for inclusion on the news section of the PSA website - www.psa-squash.com This is great publicity for your event.

May a tournament or any other person or entity offer or pay a specified sum of money to a player solely in exchange for said players' agreement to enter and compete in a tournament?

No, such an arrangement would be a "Guarantee" and therefore subject both the player and the event to the sanctions as set out in the PSA Tour Guide.

Can a tournament pay or provide for travelling expenses for professional players or members of their families, agents or coaches to or from the city of the tournament?

No, unless the PSA has granted special permission to the tournament and it is specified who will receive such expenses. Otherwise, such will constitute a "Guarantee" and subject the player and the tournament to the sanctions as set out in the PSA Tour Guide.

What happens to the fees if my event is withdrawn after registration?

Registration fees and Player Levies (and sureties from any new \$30,000+ event and Super Series deposits) are **non-refundable** if the event is withdrawn from the Tour after registration.

What is a new event fee (surety)?

New events *with a minimum \$30,000 on-site prize money* are also required to deposit with the PSA, at the time of registration, a non-refundable \$2,000USD surety. The surety will only be returned on the completion of the tournament.

Does a Super Series tournament have to provide any additional monies on registration?

These events are also required to lodge with the PSA, 6 months prior to the commencement of the qualification event, by Letter of Credit, 25% of the value of the on-site prize money, which is non-refundable in the occurrence that the tournament does not proceed.

Do I need to inform any squash authority that I am holding my event?

The PSA requires that the tournament issues a formal invitation for the President of its National Squash Federation to be present at, at least, the semi finals and finals of the event. PSA encourages the Tournament to apply the logo of its National Squash Federation on all printed material connected with the Tournament.

Who owns what rights when it comes to TV, video and the Internet?

No television or video filming whatsoever, including by spectators, will be permitted at the event without the express written permission of the PSA. **100% of all international television rights, including satellite and video news, are owned in their entirety and managed by the PSA.**
